- Sept. 15 *The Clock Dance* by Anna Taylor**
Willia Drake has had some difficult times including her mother's sudden disappearance and becoming a young widow. She longs to be a grandmother, but that may not happen. A sudden phone call from a stranger changes her life.
- Oct. 20 *America's First Daughter* by Stephanie Dray**
This is the true story of Thomas Jefferson and his family – very interesting.
- Nov. 17 *When I Was You* by Minka Kent**
This novel of psychological suspense tells how a stolen identity leads Brienne Dougray down a dark and desperate path after she barely survives a brutal attack and suffers memory loss. She believes that she can only rely on her new tenant to help her recover, but can she really?
- Dec. 15 *Unorthodox* by Deborah Feldman**
This is a true story of the author's personal journey as she breaks free of the Satmar Hasidic community in Brooklyn. Her courage and will to survive are inspiring.
- Jan. 19 Book Sharing**

- Feb. 16 *The Extraordinary Life of Sam Hell* by Robert Dugoni**
This is the story of a young boy born with ocular albinism who is bullied in school and called "Devil Boy". Both his mother and father have unusual and inappropriate ways of parenting him. He eventually grows up to be an ophthalmologist. Inspiring!
- Mar. 16 *A Woman of No Importance* by Sonja Parnell**
This is a true story of a Baltimore socialite who joined a spy organization during WWII and became essential to the French Resistance. She became known as "the Madonna of the Mountains" - true hero.
- Apr. 20 *The Dutch House* by Anne Patchett**
This book explores the indelible bond between two siblings over the course of five decades and the past that will not let them go. It's a subtle mystery.
- May 18 *Roanoke: Solving the Mystery of the Lost Colony* by Lee Miller**
The Lost Colony is America's oldest unsolved mystery. In this remarkable example of historical detective work, the author goes back to the original evidence and offers a fresh solution to this legend.
- June 15 *The Summer of '69* by Erin Hildebrand**
1969 is one of the most tumultuous summers of the 20th century. The Levin family sees how times are changing as their children look forward to spending the summer at grandma's in Nantucket; but this year things are different.
